

Here are the last 5 in our list for 2011, with a brief description of each. The events are listed in no particular order. They were all great!

Niagara Passion - Niagara Region is one of my favourite places to visit. The sweet treats, wines, fruits and vegetables that the Region has to offer along with the beautiful lush landscape, makes it wonderful place to visit. Niagara Passion offered a great amount of fun and interesting activities, including delicious wine and food tasting, great music and unique live and silent auctions. The event is located in a wonderful Niagara Region nursery that really added to the event's charm. Niagara Passion is extremely well organized by the Rotary Club of Niagara-on-the-Lake. If you enjoy great food and wine, this definitely an event to visit.

Canadian International Military Tattoo and Festival - In the heart of downtown Hamilton, lays the Copps Coliseum. 

Great Canadian Cheese Festival - After a wonderful drive through Prince Edward County along the beautiful Loyalist Parkway, we arrived at the breathtaking Crystal Palace located on the Picton Fair Grounds. We were welcomed by a gigantic Brama Bull! After a warm welcome by their many volunteers, we were in "Cheese Heaven". This Cheese Festival is an event for cheese lovers and enthusiasts. Local wines and beers were also featured. We tasted, learned and bought some one of the most diverse dairy foods available in Canada. We even tried some of the tasty wines that were being offered. Many "sweet treats" available were also a welcomed experience! Judi managed to "obtain" her share (plus) of these "treats". We congratulate the Great Canadian Cheese Festival on their inaugural event! Next year we may return to become Cheese Coinsurers"!

Battle of Fort George - As I mentioned above, one of our favourite places to visit is the Niagara Region. Fort George is located at Niagara-on-the-Lake. The Battle of Fort George re-enactment featured about 250 re-enactors representing the British/Canadian troops and American troops. The re-enactment took place over a large open field. It was very exciting! Cannon smoke filled the air, soldiers charged forward and then fell back. Rifle and cannon shots rang out and soldiers on the battlefield dropped down "dead". Unlike Fort Henry in Kingston, Fort George is an older Fort with the fortifications made from wood logs. The ends of the logs are pointed and sharp! The layout inside the Fort is simple and the buildings include two Blockhouses, a Flag Bastion, Gun Shed, Officer's Quarters, Officer's Kitchen, Artificer's Building, and Powder Magazine. So much more to discover, but a great way to spend a day with your family and friends!

Norfolk County Fair & Horse Show - Wendy Brick, the fairs Publicity and Marketing Coordinator welcomed us again to this spectacular "family" event! We believe this is one of the best fall fair events in Ontario. It has a wonderful ambiance and rustic charm that includes farm animals, fun activities, harvest displays, rural crafts, horse events, great entertainment, and so much more. As Judi said, "It is a feeling of childhood memories all wrapped up in a neat bundle." We really enjoyed watching professional divers dive into a small pool about 26 feet wide, 10 feet deep, the diving boards platform 25 meters high. The highlight for us, this year, was watching and listening to Canadian All-star Country Singer Terri Clark. It was a day to remember for a long time to come!

Part 4 - What should a GOOD WEBSITE include for Your Festivals and Events Website?

I asked Mr. King, what he thought a *GOOD WEBSITE* should include. Shawn replies ... "When I think of a Festival/Event I think of fun! The website usually gives a good reflection of what people can expect when they come out to visit.

If your website offers lots of pictures and video, it will be a great asset in promoting and enticing visitors to attend. Testimonials of people having a great time would be of benefit!

Shawn feels a poor website is one that is "too cluttered". A website that does not focus on the actual event will not be as successful. It is important to be clear and have prevalent information about your Festival/Event including details about the time, location, costs, phone numbers, maps and other relevant information. (Such as are pets allowed on the grounds to- are the grounds accessible to all?) If you see the contact information predominantly posted on your website it is inviting. It also states that you have nothing to hide and welcomes questions to assist with visitors. It is vital to have a contact telephone number at the site on the days of the Festival/Event. This will allow visitors to ask any challenging questions (from the Festival/Event being cancelled due to weather, re-located to different location, time changes, etc.) It is important to keep promoting your Festival/Event all year around. Visitors sometimes plan their outings and schedules well in advance. If they see your website and your' Festival/Event, it may just prompt them to "pencil you in".

# The Rating Game

As I have written in a previous Blog, Judi and I don't formally evaluate or rate the festivals and events we visit. We do. however, have "opinions" and to lessen the tedium of long trips, we have developed an "Event Evaluator". The "Evaluator" helps us organize our thoughts into clear sections -Promotion, Curb Appeal, Site Layout, Event Theme, and Miscellaneous Final Thoughts. It's not a "scientific" evaluation, but it suits our "discussions". I can't say that we always agree, but that's natural when we have two different sets of eyes and minds taking in the sights and sounds of festivals. Over the past 5 years, Judi and I have visited over 250 festivals and events, and we have, to some degree, discussed each one of them. We even have written "Event Evaluators" on many of them. Also, for most of these 5 years I have written more than 200 Adventures of the Festival Nomad Blogs. In them, I write about the events we have visited, the people we have met and the communities we have discovered. However, I have not, once, rated or evaluated any of the events we have visited ... that is, until now! We have now created a new website, Ontario Event Ratings (Link), that will be dedicated to evaluating and rating events that we have visited in past. Festivals/events will be rated on their Advertising & Promotion, Curb Appeal, Festival Site & Activities, Festival Theme and Final Thoughts & Overall Rating. Each area will be "Rated" on a 1 to 5 points basis, with 5 being the highest. We do, however, add a word of caution, "the rating and evaluation are the "opinions" of the writers and don't necessarily reflect those of the readers. Also, we do not attend an event for its entire duration. Our visits are only a "snap shot in time". We would encourage readers to "discover" each event for themselves. Whatever you decide, remember that Ontario festivals and events are the best and so are their event organizers and their volunteers. Anything can determine how an event appears at any given time ~ weather, time, unforeseen circumstances, etc. Always keep an open mind and if you have a suggestion or concern about an event, let the organizers know. They will appreciate your input." The first two events rated are the Norfolk County Fair & Horse Show and the Cabbagetown Festival. We will be adding one festival/event per weeks.
